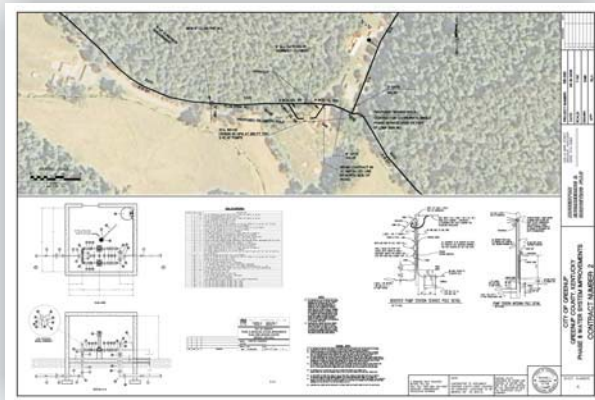

Project Description:

The City of Greenup, KY received funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 for the Phase 8 Water System Improvements. Phase 8 consisted of over 28 miles of new water line to service over 320 residents that were currently not supplied water by The City of Greenup. A 115,000 gallon glass lined tank will be installed on Fire Tower Road to serve the waterline extensions along with a new booster station on Plum Fork Road.



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Howerton Engineering & Surveying performed hydraulic analyses to determine the size of tank and booster station that would be needed to adequately supply the upgrades. Construction started in April of 2010 and is nearly complete. During the construction phase Howerton Engineering & Surveying will provide full construction services, which will include a full time inspector for each contract.



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
